ARCHITECTURAL / PROPERTY DESCRIPTION

(Include expanded description of the building/property, setting, significant landscape features, outbuildings, and alterations)

Architectural Description: The Faull house is square in plan and massing, similar to an American foursquare style of house, but exhibiting some typical Craftsman Bungalow-style elements which characterize it as an eclectic, grandly scaled example of a Craftsman Bungalow. The original owner was in the hardware business and when the house was built there were sinks in every bedroom. These have been removed, though much of the original top-quality hardware and a few of the original fixtures are still in place. The structure is built over a full basement, on a cement foundation. The attachments include an expansive porch and three hipped dormers. The back porch is probably a later addition. The eave configuration is typical bungalow-style, with wide overhanging eaves and exposed rafter tails. The dormer windows and the front porch also exhibit exposed rafters and deep eaves. The house is clad with two types of siding. The first floor is sided with clapboard, and the second floor is shingled. The facade is symmetrically composed. The windows that light the main living spaces are generously proportioned, double-hung windows with eight panes in the upper sash, over one large pane. The window and door surrounds are simple, and the frames are joined with wooden pegs. The entry door is exceptionally fine, with an oval beveled glass light. In the second story the windows are one-over-one in single grouping and regularly spaced on each elevation. The porch runs the length of the facade. Its roof is low pitched, and supported by brick columns with tabular capitals. The porch is enclosed by a slat balustrade that connects the supporting piers with two low piers without columns. The building is in excellent and near original condition, and merits inclusion in the inventory due to its grand scale and exemplary Craftsman elements, and because it is a landmark in the neighborhood.

HISTORY

(Chronological, descriptive history of the property from its construction through at least the historic period [preferably to the present])

Historical Significance: This house was built in 1915 for William and Mary Faull, on a lot that once was a brick yard. William and Mary were from Dallas, Oregon where he had been a merchant specializing in hardware and household furnishings. They came to Hillsboro to retire. William Faull was born in Benton, Wisconsin. His father set out to California during the gold rush in 1848, but died aboard ship before he arrived. William's mother was left to raise the children, including William who was only a baby at the time. In 1875 he married Mary J. Kinney of New York. They came west in 1880 and settled in Polk County, Oregon where he farmed for four years, and then became a very successful businessman. At first he was in partnership with F. Chambers in a hardware store in Dallas, but within a few years he purchased his partner's share of the store. In 1892 he built a large, two-story brick building on the main street of town. This building was one of the largest stores in Dallas at the time: the first floor was taken up with hardware and household furnishings; the second floor was a tin shop. William and Mary had no children of their own, but adopted Josie Kimball who inherited the house from Mary circa 1925. This house retains much of its architectural integrity, and is significant due to its association with William Faull, who was a prominent businessman in Polk County.
