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ARCHITECTURAL / PROPERTY DESCRIPTION

(Include expanded description of the building/property, setting, significant landscape features, outbuildings, and alterations)

Architectural Description: This two story home is an example of the Craftsman style of architecture. It is broadly massed and rectangular in plan, with a two story gabled porch on the northeast elevation. Exterior walls are clad primarily by double-profile shiplap, with wooden shingles found in the gable peaks, which are bordered at their base by a frieze with modillions. The low-pitched gables have deep eaves featuring exposed rafters, bargeboards, and purlins and knee braces. The structure has been set on a foundation of concrete since its move of relocation 500 feet from its original site. Attachments include three porches: the front, which faces northwest; a back porch; and a two-story side porch which faces northeast. The front porch is one story with a hipped roof supported by boxed posts resting on shiplap clad piers; the back is the same scale, but enclosed. The side porch is the most prominent, and is comprised of two stories; the lower level has a hipped roof which steps to accommodate a gabled open porch on the second level. Apparent Craftsman detailing includes boxed posts, railings clad by the primary siding material, and exposed rafters. Fenestrations are composed in singular and paired groupings; all are one-over-one double-hung sash with single surrounds and corniced headmolds.

HISTORY

(Chronological, descriptive history of the property from its construction through at least the historic period [preferably to the present])

Historical Significance: The Freudenthal House is a well maintained example of the Craftsman style with a fairly uncommon two story side porch. It is unique in maintaining a degree of its rural context. John Freudenthal purchased the parcel circa 1905. Before that time he and his family lived in Cornelius on a rented farm. Freudenthal was born in Germany in September 1866 and arrived in the United States in 1877 or '79. His exact arrival date in Washington County is not known, but would be previous, to his advertisement, in an 1894 Hillsboro Argus, of a farm implements auction with Will Freudenthal. He and his wife, Olga, married circa 1892 and had three living children at the time of the 1910 Census: Martha M., Henry E., and Herman J. John continued to farm this property, but it was later conveyed to his son, Herman Freudenthal, in 1935. The house has remained in the hands of the family and is currently owned by granddaughter Margaret fry, who was raised in this house.
